Subject: Amendments to Rules of Professional Conduct

The Louisiana Board of Veterinary Medicine has proposed amendments to LAC 46:LXXXV. Sections 301, 801, and 1201 in Chapters 3, 8 and 12 – respectively – in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, R.S. 49:950 et seq.

To facilitate the Department of Justice's review of the proposed rule, Louisiana Board of Veterinary Medicine provides answers to the following questions.

1. Describe any relevant factual background to the occupational regulation and the purpose of the occupational regulation? *[Explain]*

The substantive amendments to sections 301.F, 801.F, and 1201.E will change the length of time for which an application is valid from two years to one year from the initial application submission date. The Board determined that this amendment is reasonable due to several changes which have accelerated the application process including: the Board's transition to an online application process; the establishment of an online testing option for the required state jurisprudence exam; the repeal of the letters of recommendation requirement for licensure; the repeal of the eight-week preceptorship program requirement for DVM licensure; the addition of three total CAET trainings annually; and, the addition of a third testing window annually for the national exam (NAVLE) for DVMs. The purpose of reducing the lifespan of the applications for licensure/certification is to ensure that all application details submitted are as accurate and up-to-date as possible. By requiring applicants to submit all application reviews and issue licenses and certificates more judiciously.

2. Is the occupational regulation within the scope of the occupational licensing board's general authority to regulate in a given occupation or industry? If so, identify the law that provides the authority for the rule and describe how the occupational regulation is within the scope. *[Explain]*

This Notice of Intent is within the Louisiana Board ("Board") of Veterinary Medicine's statutory authority to review the qualifications of candidates applying for licensure in accordance with La R.S. 37, section §1518, §1520, §1543, and §1553.

La R.S. 37:1518 enumerates the powers of the Board which include the examination and determination of qualifications and fitness of applicants, with La R.S. 37:1520 specifying those qualifications and supporting information and documentation as the Board may require by rule.

The purpose of reducing the lifespan of the applications for licensure/certification is to ensure that all application details submitted are as accurate and up-to-date as possible. Requiring applicants to submit all application material in a much timelier manner ensures that the Board can conduct final application reviews and issue licenses and certificates more judiciously. Issuing licenses and certificates to qualified individuals more quickly helps better protect the public and animals of Louisiana from the unlicensed practice of veterinary medicine by unqualified individuals and further reduces the shortage of qualified veterinary professionals in the state of Louisiana.

5. Do any less restrictive alternatives to the occupational regulation exist for addressing the same harm? If so, include a comparison of the occupational regulation to the alternatives and a justification for not pursuing a less restrictive alternative. If no less restrictive alternatives exist, explain why. *[Explain]*

No. This amendment would increase the timeliness of application material and subsequently increase the speed with which the Board can issue licenses and certificates.

- 02-10-2025 Notice of Intent will be submitted to Department of Justice's Occupational Licensing Review Program (OLRP) for review.
